

Reflections from the Rector

From the desk of Reverend Diane Pike

This week is the Church's observance of the Holy Trinity – the One in Three and Three in One. We might be well-advised to leave it there, take it on faith and move on. It is one of the weeks most preachers dread ... what does one do with the doctrine of the Trinity? Most of us do not preach doctrine; we preach how to live our lives in faith with the Living Christ.

One word I remember distinctly from seminary Greek is ousia (ooo-see-yah) – of one substance which cannot be divided. The Holy Trinity is one substance from which three entities - God, Son, Holy Spirit - emanate in and through God's creation - the world, the saints of heaven and us.

If I peeled an orange and put it in front of you; the peeling, the orange sections, and the seeds – and asked you which was the orange, your answer would probably be "all of it." And that would be correct. Each part is of the orange, though each has a different purpose in the existence of the orange. The seeds will provide new growth, the orange segments are edible and nutritious, and the tough exterior skin protects the fruit and the seeds. The difference is that ousia – the Trinity – cannot be divided as the orange is. That is the rub in trying to explain the Trinity.

Our creeds talk about our beliefs in one God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit. We affirm that belief each week during our corporate worship. But do we really understand what we are saying, what we are affirming when we say, "We believe in ...?" If you are curious about the doctrine of the Trinity, check out the catechism that can be found at the end of the Book of Common Prayer. The creed of St. Athanasius speaks about God Announcements the Creator, the Son – Jesus – Who is the Redeemer, and the Holy Spirit Who sustains us in Christ's absence on Earth. It is an interesting creed and explores, in a deeper way, the one substance which cannot be divided ... ousia.

So why is the Trinity part of our doctrine? Why is it important?

The simple answer is because God is the great Creator and Lover of the world. God became incarnate as the Son, Jesus, and came to Earth to redeem God's people to God's self. Following the execution of the Son, the Holy Spirit – the Advocate – exists with us to guide us, to protect us and to lead us. The Trinity is the foundation of our theology as Christians and as our doctrine as Episcopalians. I think it is important for us to understand what it is we say we believe before receiving Holy Communion.

Unfortunately, trying to define and explain the Trinity limits God. Our explanations put God, Son and Spirit into neat little boxes, because that is how we like to order things. We like things neat and tidy, and there is nothing neat or tidy about the Trinity. If the Trinity were neat and tidy it would not be God Who is everywhere and is everything all of the time. God is too big to be organized so our little brains can understand the doctrine.

Maybe it is good that we cannot really get our heads around the doctrine of the Trinity. Maybe it is good that God is so big that we cannot define God's unlimited love and omnipotence in theology and catechesis. And, maybe, just maybe, this talk about the Trinity might help us to evolve our thinking about God and provide more room for God in our hearts and minds. https://www.swmecovenant.org/

• Which parish is your "home" parish? How long have you been there?
