Reflections from the Rector

From the desk of Reverend Diane Pike

I could have planted my flowers in May when we had rain, but it was so chilly I was afraid of frost. So I waited until June. Now we are in a drought. Wildflower seeds were sown the last week of May for the bees and the hummingbirds. No rain. How are we supposed to know when to – or not to – plant our summer gardens?

There are several passages of scripture that speak about a sower, a farmer, a landowner, a vineyard keeper, or a shepherd. Remember the people following Jesus, the people who Jesus healed and prayed with, were agrarian people. They made their living off the land.

Imagine the sower in the gospel of Mark for this weekend. Seeds fall everywhere...some in good soil, some on rocky land and some get eaten by hungry birds. How frustrating for anyone who has tried to grow anything from seed, and this sower was setting seed in order to earn a living allowing him/her to care for his/her family.

In the story the gospeler tells us how the grain grows ... first the stalk, then the head, then the full head – and at what point the sower harvests the grain with the sickle. "Come ye faithful people come," a familiar hymn often sung near Thanksgiving, contains these words in the first two verses:

1 Come, ye thankful people, come, raise the song of harvest home; all is safely gathered in, ere the winter storms begin. God our Maker doth provide for our wants to be supplied; come to God's own temple, come, raise the song of harvest home.

2 All the world is God's own field, fruit as praise to God we yield; wheat and tares together sown are to joy or sorrow grown; first the blade and then the ear, then the full corn shall appear; Lord of harvest, grant that we wholesome grain and pure may be.

The hymn writer captures the true essence of this passage of scripture – all the world is God's own field. None of it belongs to us. We are merely stewards of God's divine grace and generosity. Like the hymnist, we should also pray to become wholesome and pure wheat in our thoughts, actions, and relationship with others.

When this passage from Mark comes around in the Revised Common Lectionary I often pause to think about the miracle that is that little seed I put in the ground. It is dead. It takes water and sunshine to grow – to be resurrected. While we are more than a little seed, we are but dead save for the death and resurrection of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

Give thanks for the rain. Feel the sunshine on your face. Bless the seedlings and all of the growing plants and trees living with you in Creation. For God's bounty is abundant. God is good.
